

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are seeking your help to support the students in our school with severe allergies.

Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction that is life-threatening. The most common causes of anaphylaxis in schools are allergies to food and insects (bees).

At Drouin West PS, we have students who have severe anaphylactic reactions to foods. These include:

- A student in Prep: Anaphylactic reactions to egg, nuts, milk, and dairy foods.
- Students in Years 5/6: Anaphylactic reactions to nuts.

To help manage allergies and reduce the risk of severe allergic reactions we have regular training for our staff and will educate students about allergies and anaphylaxis.

We ask you to help us to raise awareness and reduce risks at school is by having conversations with your child. This could include:

- · Understanding that egg, milk/dairy, and nuts are dangerous for some students at our school
- · We all have different needs and it's important for us to keep each other safe
- The importance of following school rules and procedures around eating foods
 - o Not sharing food
 - o Eating at designated areas
 - o Following handwashing procedures around eating times
- The importance of getting help immediately if a friend with an allergy feels sick

How can families support allergy aware schools?



If your child has an allergy:



 Tell the school about your child's allergies when you enrol them.



- Work with the school to plan for activities that involve food (such as food technology lessons or social occasions) and talk to the teacher who is organising the activity.
- If your child is attending a school camp, talk to the teacher who is organising the camp or activity. Ask them for the contact details of the camp caterer so that you can talk to them about your child's food allergies.



 Before your child starts school, give the school a copy of your child's ASCIA Action Plan.

 The ASCIA Action Plan should be completed by your child's doctor or nurse practitioner.



Teach your child about their allergy.

 This will depend on your child's age, allergies and abilities.



 Meet with the school to talk about what the school can do to care for your child while at school, at excursions and on camps.

Give the school one of your child's adrenaline injectors

(in date), along with any other

medication (such as antihistamine

and asthma reliever medication).



Children with food allergy need to:

- Learn about the food they are allergic to.

- Learn how to talk with others about their allergies.
- Wash their hands before and after eating.
- Not share food.
- Only drink from their own water bottle.
- Only eat food provided by a trusted adult who knows about their food allergies.
- Tell a teacher if they feel unwell.



 Let the school know if your child's allergies change and give the school a copy of the updated ASCIA Action Plan.



· Children with insect allergy need to:

- Learn about the insect they are allergic to.

 Learn how to talk with others about their allergy.

- Keep their shoes on when playing outside.

 Be careful when at outdoor swimming events if they do not have shoes on.

 Drink from a container with a lid and be careful if drinking from cans.











If your child does not have an allergy your family can support allergy aware schools in the following ways:



 Help the school look after children with allergies by supporting the ways the school reduces the risk of a child having an allergic reaction.



 Teach your child about how to care for their friends and other children with allergies.



 Talk to your child about how everyone has different health needs and teach them to be respectful of the needs of other children.



- Caring for children with allergies includes:
- Washing hands before and after eating.
- Not sharing food.
- Only drinking from their own water bottle.
- Telling a teacher if their friend is sick.

Student accident insurance, ambulance cover arrangements and private property brought to school

The Education Department and Drouin West Primary School does not provide personal accident insurance or ambulance cover for students. Parents/carers of students, who do not have student accident insurance/ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance or transport as well as any other transport costs.

In some circumstances, medical or other expenses will be paid by the Department where it is assessed that it is likely that the Department is liable for negligent acts or omissions of its staff or volunteers. More information about the claims process is available below.

It is the responsibility of parents/carers to investigate their preferred options in this regard. The Department cannot provide advice to parents/carers on the purchase of individual student accident policy or ambulance cover.

Private property brought to school by students, staff or visitors is not insured and the Department does not accept any responsibility for any loss or damage.

This can include mobile phones, calculators, toys, sporting equipment and cars parked on school premises. As the Department does not hold insurance for personal property brought to schools and has no capacity to pay for any loss or damage to such property, students and staff should be discouraged from bringing any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school.



Parents/carers can purchase insurance policies from commercial insurers.

Main Neerim Road closure

between Pepperell Drive and Walton Road, Drouin Plan ahead from 8 January 2024

From 8 January 2024, APA Group will be undertaking necessary maintenance on a section of the Longford to Dandenong gas transmission pipeline in Drouin. This is one of the critical pipelines that supply gas into the Melbourne metro area.

Main Neerim Road will be closed between Pepperell Drive and Walton Road, with two detours in place to help you to travel around the area. Access for vehicles travelling northbound on Main Neerim Road up to the intersection of Pepperell Drive will be maintained.

Detour 1: Two-way traffic via Walton Road, Higgs Road, Buln Buln Road and Princes Way – for local traffic only.

Detour 2: Two-way traffic via Princes Way and Old Sale Road – for local traffic and all heavy vehicles.

This work is expected to take until the end of April 2024 to complete, so please plan ahead and allow for extra travel time and changes to speed limits in the area.

For safety, cyclists and pedestrians are advised to take alternative routes around the work site.



These include


- Centrelink CRNs for yourself and the child you are enrolling
- 2 Credit card or bank account details for direct debit purposes
- Emergency contact details in case you are not contactable in an emergency
- Authorised nominees for drop off and collection
- Doctor, Medicare, immunisations details for your child
- Any medical or health details for your child
